Course Description: English IV students will:

- Develop critical thinking, rhetorical and writing skills through the use of nonfiction, novels and drama.
- Explore the theme of power, as it relates to the individual, government and society.

Materials Required:

- A folder/binder/system of organization.
- Flash drive or other method of storing electronic documents.
- Textbook: All books for English IV are supplemental and may be purchased (recommended) or borrowed from the Textbook Café.

Activities:

- In class assignments:
 - o discussion (This will be the fundamental basis for the course)
 - o problem solving activities (daily participation grade)
 - o reading, interpreting and analyzing text
 - o analyzing argumentation
 - o development of good writing skills

• Homework:

- o reading text (essential to successfully completing the course)
- o response to text (all assignments need to be typed)
- Scrapbook (225 pts):
 - To be completed throughout the semester: Due Wednesday, Dec 17th by 3pm. Any scrapbook turned in after 3pm will receive ½ credit. No scrapbook will be accepted after Dec 18th.
 - o Rough drafts of each section are due on the following dates:

• Fiction book of your choice (100 pts)

o To be read outside of class.

- You must commit to a book by October 14st. Any potential change in the choice of book must be submitted in writing and approved by me. No change in book will be approved after October 14thst.
- o A project will be completed to be presented on the day of the final exam.

- Creative Non-fiction: The Personal Essay and George Orwell's *Shooting an Elephant*
- Schindler's List (Bring to class on **September 8**)
